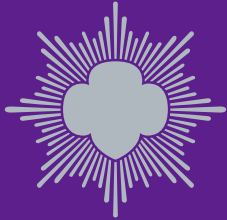

Silver Award Project Breakdown

T-Totes: Reducing the Impact of Plastic Bags on the Environment

Issue:

Negative impact that plastic grocery bags have on the planet.

Measurability:

Estimated to prevent more than 8,000 bags from ending up in landfills.

Sustainability:

Each bag included detailed instructions on how to make t-totes.

Project Details:

Collected 550 used T-shirts to sew into T-totes, reusable bags made from the shirt material. Bags were distributed at local farmers market and food pantries.
