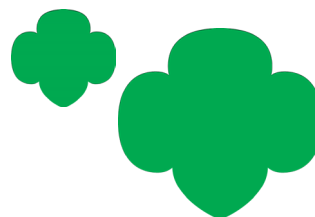

SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS

» Project Anti-Violence Education (PAVE)

An innovative program developed to help girls grow strong by empowering them to prevent violence in their lives. The program has been delivered to more than 187,000 youth in eastern Missouri since its inception in 2000.

» Girl Scouts Beyond Bars

For girls with incarcerated mothers to maintain the mother/daughter bond and break the cycle of crime while learning how to grow strong in a supportive Girl Scout troop environment.

» Challenge & Change

Encourages girls living in rural communities to become social entrepreneurs who make the world a better place.

» Making CENTS Financial Literacy Program

A year-long program on building awareness, knowledge, and confidence in the world of finance and money management.

» STEPS (Science, Technology and Engineering Preview)

Exploring math, science, engineering and technology fields, girls team up with St. Louis Community College professors and staff.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

April Showers Personal Care Item Drive

In 1998, our council launched this extraordinary program. Personal care items, which include soap, shampoo and deodorant, cannot be purchased with food stamps and prior to 1997 accounted for less than one percent of donations to local food pantries and shelters. In April 2010, local Girl Scouts collected more than 1.1 million items for local families and individuals in need. Girl Scouts' collection efforts now represent 99 percent of all personal care items distributed in our region.
